# WE EMPOWER GRASSROOTS ORGANIZATIONS AROUND THE WORLD



In India, **PEOPLE FIRST** has been working for over 20 years in some of the poorest districts of India with life changing projects in education, child protection, women's rights, community healthcare and vocational training.



**REACH A HAND UGANDA** uses a youth-centered approach to empower young people with livelihood & skills development training, sexual reproductive health & rights education, and HIV/AIDS awareness & prevention.



In Haiti, the **VICTOR HUGO SCHOOL** represents the efforts of local people to make things better for the next generation in a community devastated by disaster and without a public school system. They provide free education and skills development to children of all ages.

# GRASSROOTS SPOTLIGHT



## Kliptown Youth Program (KYP) South Africa

Joined One World in 2016

KYP provides tutoring, athletic, and arts programs for children living in Kliptown, South Africa. KYP's programs create opportunities for children living in poverty to be active community members, to achieve their dreams, and most of all, to have hope for their futures.

## 2018 Top Achievements:

- 500 children fed nutritious meals every day – 132,000 total meals served in 2018
- 91% pass rate for KYP 2018 matriculants
- 2 KYP students successfully graduated with diplomas in real estate and one student successfully completed his National Diploma in accounting at the University of Johannesburg
- Established a Work-Readiness Program to help youth enter the workforce with interviewing and job skills

# GRASSROOTS SPOTLIGHT

## Empowering Youth Cambodia (EYC) Cambodia

Joined One World in 2015

EYC works with vulnerable children and youth living in urban slum communities to unlock their talent and change their futures. EYC provides education, career training, healthcare, athletics and personal development. Building community is a key component of EYC's work, with all children participating in community service.



## 2018 Top Achievements:

- 945 at-risk young people, aged 6-24, served
- 281 home visits conducted, keeping 163 at-risk kids in school
- 1,105 dental appointments provided for students, with an additional 2,773 medical appointments provided for community members
- 19 young men and women sent to university, including one to study abroad in the United States

# GRASSROOTS SPOTLIGHT



## Offin Children's Center (OCC) Ghana

Joined One World in 2017

OCC provides shelter, sustenance, and support for orphans and vulnerable children. They also provide schooling for preschool through high school students in the the surrounding community. Financial assistance is provided to students who otherwise would not be able to attend.

### 2018 Top Achievements:

- Expanded to include third year of high-school and received full accreditation. The inaugural class of 30 students will graduate in 2019.
- 3 OCC kids completed a post-secondary program, increasing the total number of OCC post-secondary graduates to 19.
- Completed construction of new toilet and bathing facilities, and broke ground on a science building.

# GRASSROOTS SPOTLIGHT

## Tingathe Malawi

Joined One World in 2017

Tingathe works with youth and young adults who are unemployed or disconnected from school in Lilongwe, Malawi. Tingathe provides marketable skills, loans to start businesses, job training, and employment assistance to help youth become thriving members of their communities.



## 2018 Top Achievements:

- 160 students received vocational training in carpentry, fashion, arts, hospitality, and other high employment industries.
- 150 children participated in an 11-week program teaching crucial life skills, such as sexual and reproductive health, communication, and children's rights.
- 320 children benefited from an educational program about gender-based violence taught through sports.

# 2018 HIGHLIGHTS

- ❖ **Dandelion Africa (Kenya)** immunized 2,505 children through their Mobile Backpack Nurse Program and was featured on [helloclue.com](http://helloclue.com) for their article titled “Boys can teach about menstruation, too.”
- ❖ **People First (India)** was approved as the nodal agency for ‘Railway Childline,’ a joint initiative by the Ministry of Women & Child Development and Ministry of Railways, to provide care and protection to children at the Gaya Junction Railway Station.
- ❖ In the Trend Privé article “How Fashion and Fair Wages Feed Families in East Africa,” **Kaz’O’zah (Burundi)**, was featured for bringing fashion to the forefront of social impact.
- ❖ **Compalciht (Nicaragua)** opened up a new school and feeding center. The number of children fed daily doubled from 300 to 600.
- ❖ **CTD (Kenya)** provided shelter to 20 young female victims of trafficking from Nepal, Uganda, Ethiopia and Burundi.
- ❖ In collaboration with Vanderbilt University, **Lwala (Kenya)** published an under-5 mortality study in the journal PLOS One.
- ❖ **Reach a Hand Uganda** founder, Humphrey Nabimanya, was named among the 100 Most Influential Young Africans of 2018.
- ❖ **Akili Dada (Kenya)** was awarded the African Woman Award by IDRC for contributions to the transformation of gender relations in Africa.

# VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT



## Pa-O National Development Organization (PNDO) Thailand & Myanmar

Joined One World in 2012

PNDO provides humanitarian assistance to the Pa-O people and other ethnic populations living along the Thai-Myanmar border. PNDO works with communities to provide education and health services, and to preserve cultural traditions.

## A huge thank you to our volunteer community!

One World's volunteer Grassroots Champions raise funds and awareness for organizations abroad.

In November 2018, Champion **Barbara Slone** visited PNDO in Myanmar. Barbara has volunteered with One World for 10 years, supporting multiple grassroots organizations.

While in Myanmar, Barbara toured 13 schools run by PNDO that serve more than 2,000 students. Barbara returned to the United States with renewed energy and ideas for supporting PNDO. Her subsequent fundraising campaign, based on stories of the children she met during her travels, resulted in a significant increase in funding for PNDO.

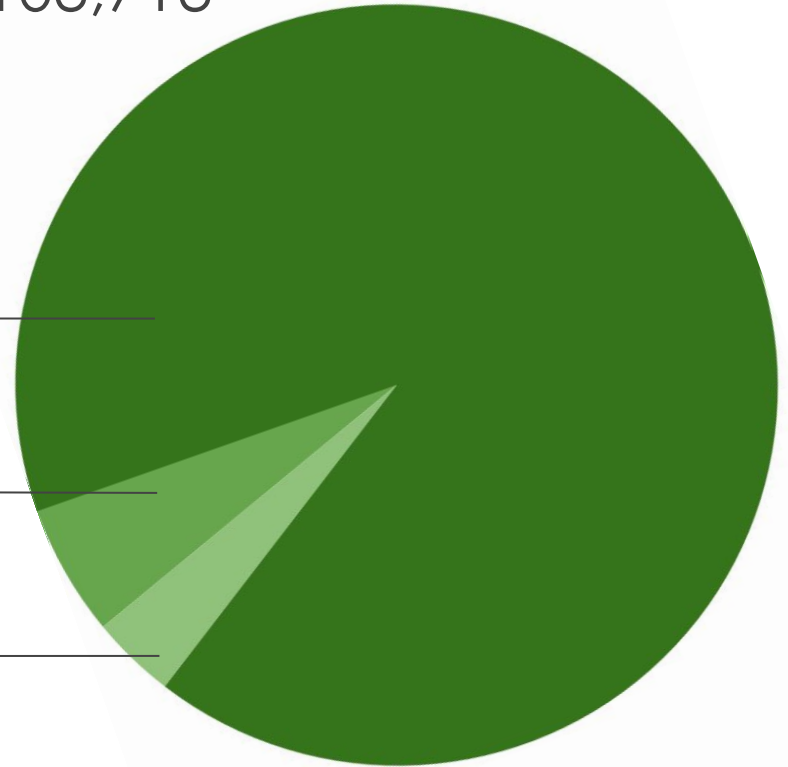
